 - 12 Student Shuttle Drivers

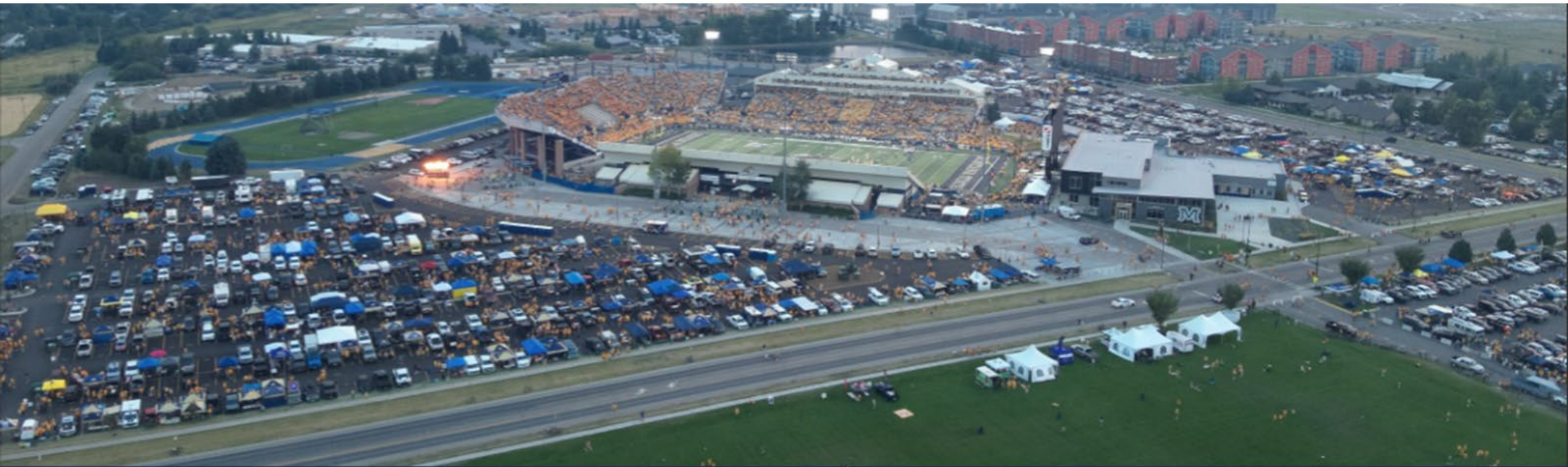

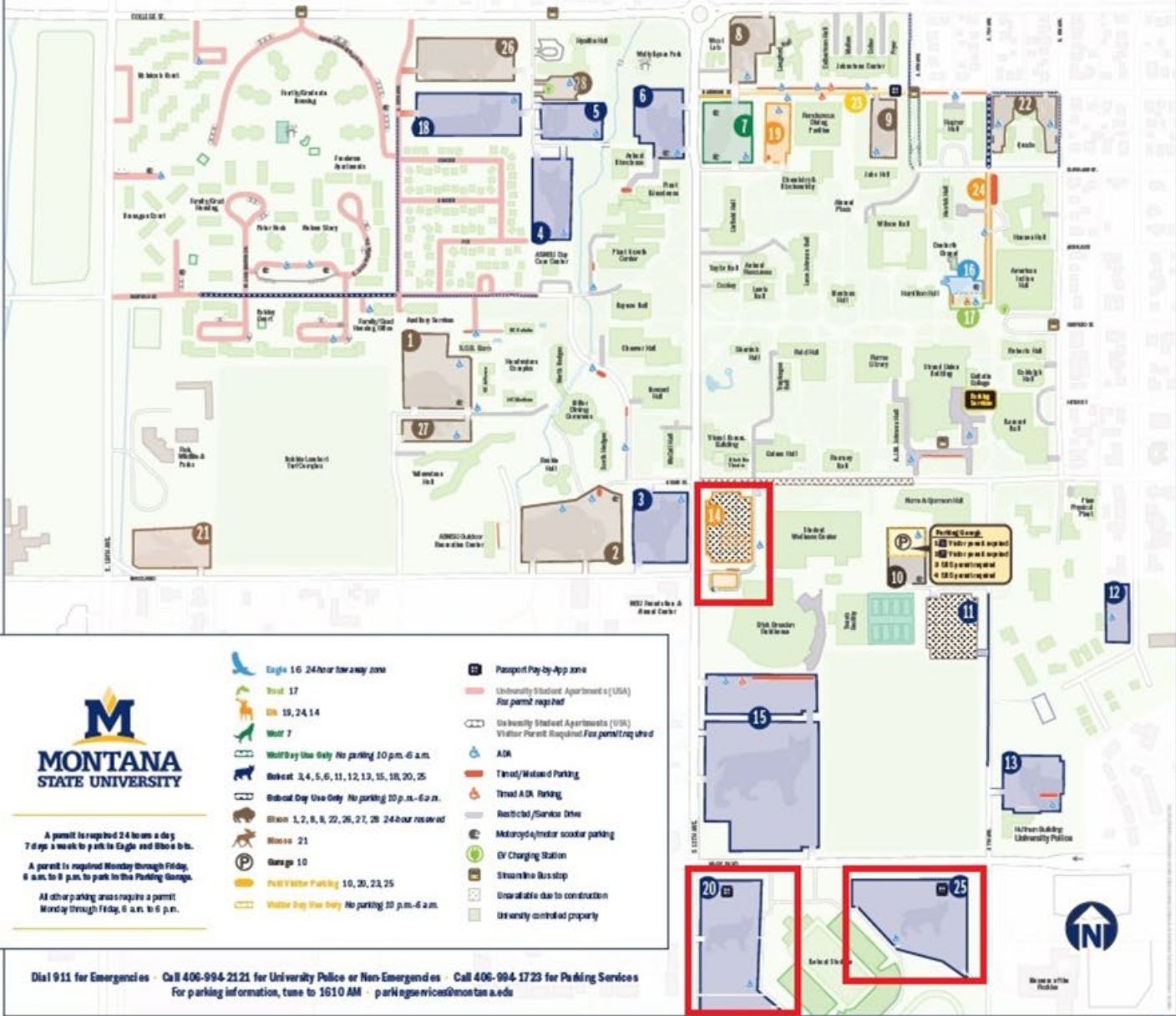
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Changes in Lot designations

What have been the impacts?



A permit is required 24 hours a day 7 days a week to park in Elk and Bobcat lots.
 A permit is required Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., to park in the Parking Garage.
 All other parking areas require a permit Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

*Dr. Austin noted that the faculty with requisite expertise are no longer at MSU, and these courses are not required for their major.

- This title change is in keeping with our peer institutions with similar programs. We have found that our graduates struggle to get interviews because employers do not understand what our program is as we are still using an Antiquated name (industrial Technology). This old Title is a hold over from the 1960's when technology education was called industrial arts.
